Their Encouragement

A. Resurrection – Gives Hope (verse 8)

"The Lord's victory over death and His present position should inspire confidence within a church that was about to suffer imprisonment and tribulation even unto death."

"For He who became dead is now alive and able to give victory over every obstacle, even death."

 Few now suffer the kind of persecution endured by the early Christians. Matthew 10:21-25, 34ff; Hebrews 10:32ff

Revelation 2:10, "Fear not (cf. 1:17) the things which thou art about to suffer"

"behold, the devil is about to cast some of you into prison,

Prison in those days was understood to be a prelude to execution.

"that ye may be tried; and ye shall have tribulation ten days."

- Ten days represented a full period of testing which can be measured.
- Or perhaps it meant that they would suffer to their full limit.

Their Encouragement

Revelation 2:10, "Fear not (cf. 1:17) the things which thou art about to suffer"

"Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee the crown of life."

- If their faith was loyal even to the point of death, the Lord promised an eternal crown in honor of their triumph over tribulation and death. 2 Timothy 4:6-8; 1 Peter 5:4; 1 Corinthians 9:25ff
- The hope that we have of God's promised inheritance of the faithful should produce in us "joy unspeakable."
 1 Peter 1:3-9

Their Encouragement

- C. Can Overcome (verse 11) "He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith to the churches. He that overcometh shall not be hurt of the second death"
- All men will experience the "first death" (i.e., physical, Hebrews 9:27).
- But those who turn away from the Lord will suffer eternal separation (i.e., spiritual death) in a place described as "a lake of fire" (Revelation 20:14-15; 21:8).

Revelation 2:8-11

"The beauty of this city, which rivaled Ephesus, was the beauty of a resurrection. Seven hundred years before, old Smyrna had been destroyed, and had lain in ruins for three centuries. The city of John's time was one which had risen from the dead. And resurrection was to be the experience of its church also."

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

Letters To Seven Church of Asia

(Revelation 2-3)

- Some were **good** (Smyrna, Philadelphia)
- Some were <u>good / bad</u> (Ephesus, Pergamum, Thyatira, Sardis)
- One was <u>bad</u> (Laodicea)

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Letters To Seven Church of Asia

(Revelation 2-3)









- Most of us would like to be in a GOOD church (no condemnation)
- None of us would have anything to do with a BAD church (no commendation)
- Reality: may be in a church that is GOOD / BAD (Some commendation and some condemnation)



 190 BC with help of Rome expelled Antiochus III (Syrian king) – King Attalus III bequeathed the city and the entire kingdom to Rome.

- A city of temples devoted to sensuous worship. Various patron deities were worshiped here: Zeus, Athene, and Dionysus.
- Especially abhorrent to Christians was the temple built in honor of Aesculapius, the god of healing, whose emblem was that of a serpent, a symbol to Christians of the serpent of Eden.

- Perhaps of greatest significance affecting the church was that Pergamum was the center of the imperial cult.
- In 29 BC the first temple was approved to be built in Asia in honor of the divine Augustus and the goddess Roma.
- The establishment of this temple and the development of the imperial cult gave rise to the city's enforcement of loyalty to "Lord Caesar."

The Author:

Revelation 2:12, "These things saith he that hath the sharp two-edged sword" (1:16; 2:12, 16; 19:15, 21)

rhomphaia – "a large, broad sword used for both cutting and piercing." (Greek-English Lexicon Based on Semantic Domain)
The sword indicates keen and accurate judgment.
machaira – cf. Hebrews 4:12 "death by violence or execution"
(Greek-English Lexicon Based on Semantic Domain). Used of the short
Roman sword, used in Revelation 6:4; 13:10, 14; Romans 13:4

I. Its Strength

- A. Works (verse 13), "I know where thou dwellest, (even) where Satan's throne is; and thou holdest fast my name, and didst not deny my faith, even in the days of Antipas my witness, my faithful one, who was killed among you, where Satan dwelleth."
 - 1. Active
 - 2. Busy
 - 3. Do more than think, talk, and plan

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Revelation 2:12-17

I. Its Strength

- A. Works (verse 13) "I know where thou dwellest, (even) where Satan's throne is"
- B. Pergamum had become the stronghold of Satan's activity. He had established himself as a king on his throne in this city.
- C. Christians were not told to leave a situation or to live in isolation.
- D. Instead, the Lord encouraged them to stay and fight. They could still shine as a light in the midst of darkness.

Revelation 2:12-17

I. Its Strength

C. Hold fast to my name (verse 13)

The emperor insisted upon being addressed as dominus et deus, a title corresponding to the one given to Jesus in Thomas' confession, "my Lord and my God" (John 20:28).

- Christ is Lord of Lords (Revelation 17:14) cannot acknowledge any other Lord (i.e. Caesar)
- 2. Recognize his authority (Acts 4:7)

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
