 - God held the church responsible for its members. We need the constant presence of others who will "reprove, rebuke, and exhort" (2 Timothy 4:2).

 - 3. Kill children with death
- D. The choice was theirs (verse 22) Galatians 6:7-8; Hebrews 13:4

Letters To Seven Church of Asia

(Revelation 2-3)

- Some were **good** (Smyrna, Philadelphia)
- Some were <u>good / bad</u> (Ephesus, Pergamum, Thyatira, Sardis)
- One was <u>bad</u> (Laodicea)

Letters To Seven Church of Asia (Revelation 2-3)













- Most of us would like to be in GOOD church (no condemnation)
- None of us would have anything to do with a BAD church (no commendation)
- Reality: may be in a church that is GOOD / BAD (Some commendation and some condemnation)

The Church At Sardis (Revelation 3:1-6)

May have been shocked – To learn they were dead!



Yet – they had many desirable qualities

Revelation 3:1-6

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- · Capital of Lydia.
- 50 miles east of Smyrna.
- 70 miles southeast of Pergamum.
- · Great commercial city.
- · Strong military position.
- The city where production of money coins began.
- The city of Sardis was also notorious for its pleasures and luxury loving spirit.
 - The wealthier the city became, the more decadent its citizens grew.
- · Had prominent temples.



- Sardis was a city confident of its security.
 - Located on a narrow ridge of rock jutting from Mount Tmolus, this city seemed to be an impregnable fortress. Except for the one entrance from the south, the other three sides of this plateau were bounded by smooth, apparently unscalable mountain rock rising perpendicularly 1500 feet above the plain.

Revelation 3:1-6

Sardis was a city confident of its security.

"The Greek historian Herodotus gave an account of how the Persian king, Cyrus, captured Sardis in 549 B.C. (*Herodotus 1.84*). He offered a reward to his troops to any man who found a way to penetrate what seemed to be an unscalable mountain. One of his men observed that a Lydian soldier on the rampart above accidentally dropped his helmet down the mountainside. The Lydian soldier carefully picked his way down through a narrow crevice to recover his helmet and climbed back again. That night the observant Persian soldier led a band of men up the cliffs by the way he had meticulously marked in his memory. They found the battlements completely unguarded because the Lydian king never thought anyone could find a way up the side of the steep cliffs. Sardis felt completely safe and secure, but that night the city fell to the enemy." (Harkrider, pager 130)

 - a. Past stand
 - b. Members that are known
 - c. Preacher they had or have
 - d. How they stood on one issue
