Lesson 13: In Jerusalem For the Feast

November 11, 2020 **Jesus' Journey To Jerusalem** Luke 9:51-56

Jesus' Brothers

Jesus understood His relationship to the world. Jesus told His brothers:

- "The world cannot hate you ..." (John 15:19). Why?
- "... It hates Me because I testify of it, that it's deeds are evil." (1 Kings 22:7-8; cf. I Kings 18:17; John 3:19; 15:25)
- The application to His disciples. (John 15:18-20)

"Having said these things to them, He stayed in Galilee." (John 7:9)

Jesus' Journey to Jerusalem

Luke 9:51-56

"But when His brothers had gone up to the feast, then He Himself also went up, **not publicly, but as if, in secret.**" (John 7:10)

"When the days were approaching for His ascension, **He was determined (set His face) to go to Jerusalem**" (Luke 9:51; cf. Isaiah 50:7, note verse 4-10; Jeremiah 42:15)

"When the days were approaching for His ascension ..." (Mark 16:19: Acts 2:32-33)

- ""Determined" or "set His face" (ABYVESV) means "to set fast, i.e., (literally) to turn resolutely in a certain direction." (Strong)(cf. Acts 11:23; 21:13-14)
- Luke 13:33, "... I must journey on ..." (to Jerusalem.)
- "Going as it has been determined." (Luke 22:22)

Jesus' Journey to Jerusalem

Luke 9:51-56

"... He sent messengers on ahead of Him, and they went and entered a village of the Samaritans to make arrangements for Him." (Luke 9:51-52)

The most direct route to Jerusalem from Galilee would take Jesus and His company through Samaria.

Remember when Jesus left Judea for Galilee and passed through Samaria (John 4:3-42) where "many of the Samaritans believed in Him" in the city of Sychar and knew that "this One is indeed the Savior of the world." (verses 39, 42)

Jesus' Journey to Jerusalem

Luke 9:51-56

"But they did not receive Him, because He was traveling toward Jerusalem." (Luke 9:51)

Others besides the Samaritan woman of John 4:9 would have had the same attitude of being disinclined to practice hospitality because the "Jews have no dealings with Samaritans."

- Especially when the purpose of passing through Samaria was to reject their place of worship to go to Jerusalem to worship.
- Interesting that the account of the good Samaritan (Luke 10:30-37) follows on the heels of this.

Jesus' Journey to Jerusalem

Luke 9:51-56

The reaction of James and John to the Samaritans:

"When His disciples James and John saw this, they said, 'Lord, do You want us to command fire to come down from heaven and consume them?" (Luke 9:54; cf. 2 Kings 1:9-16)

How would you describe James' and John's reaction? What would be the ultimate outcome of the Samaritans if their request was granted?

Jesus' Journey to Jerusalem

Luke 9:51-56

"But He turned and rebuked them, [and said, 'You do not know what kind of spirit you are of; for the Son of Man did not come to destroy men's lives, but to save them."] And they went on to another village." (Luke 9:55-56)

James and John had displayed "the spirit of the world" rather than "the Spirit who is from God."

(1 Corinthians 2:12; cf. Ephesians 2:2; Romans 8:5-8)

We must be led by the "Spirit of Christ" (Romans 8:9) and not the flesh as James and John were.

Jesus' purpose wasn't to "destroy" but to "save." (John 3:17; 12:47; Luke 19:10)

What is our duty? (Romans 12:14-21)

"Follow Me ..."

Luke 9:57-62

"As they were going along the road, someone said to Him, 1 will follow You wherever You go." (Luke 9:57)

- Note that this "someone" was a scribe. (Matthew 8:19)
- Why did some "follow" Jesus? (John 6:26)

Jesus is addressing **commitment**. Notice the last verse of this context:

 "No one, after putting his hand to the plow and looking back, is fit for the kingdom of God." (Luke 9:62)

"Follow Me ..."

Luke 9:57-62

"As they were going along the road, someone said to Him, 'I will follow You wherever You go."" (Luke 9:57)

Jesus, knowing his heart, knew he wasn't thinking about the cost of following Him and said in reply:

"The foxes have holes and the birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay His head." (Luke 9:58)

- Following Jesus means sacrifice. (2 Samuel 24:24)
- Following Jesus means contentment. (Philippians 4:11)
- A mindset of "sojourners and pilgrims" (1 Peter 2:11 ASV)

The Lord asks each of us to "calculate the cost." (Luke 14:25ff)

"Follow Me ..."

Luke 9:57-62

Jesus approached someone else as they journeyed and simply said: "Follow Me." (Luke 9:59; cf. Luke 5:27-28)

This individual (a "disciple" – Matthew 8:21) responded by saying: "Lord, permit me first to go and bury my father." (Luke 9:59)

• What is the key word he said?

Not that it's wrong to properly bury one's father.

- What comes before our following the Lord?
- · What comes before our worship?
- · What comes before our service?
- What comes first? (Matthew 6:33)
