Forgiveness

SIN AND FORGIVENESS

MATTHEW 18:15-35

Beginning with verse 7, Jesus is teaching about:

- The seriousness of sin and the need to do everything possible to prevent it (verses 7-11; Matthew 5:29-30).
- The need to seek those lost in sin (verses 12-14; Galatians 6:1; James 5:19-20),
- The need for forgiveness of sin (verses 21-35; Psalms 130:3-4).

Why would we think that verses 15-20 are talking about God being with us while we're pursuing fleshly pursuits?

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The **immediate context of verses 15-20** – Jesus is addressing our **personal responsibility** to:

- Seek a brother/sister who has sinned, our efforts to restore them (cf. Galatians 6:1), and
- Understand when we are to forgive them
 - (When he "listens" and repents)
- Understand when we are to consider him as a "Gentile and tax-gatherer"
 - (When "he refuses to listen" and repent).

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Jesus teaches **4 steps** in seeking the "brother" who has gone astray and is perishing:

1) "If your brother sins, **go and show him his fault in private**; if he listens to you, you have won your brother." (Matthew 18:15)

Some manuscripts add "... sins against you ..."

Does it matter?

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"Go and show" - How?

- Leviticus 19:17; Galatians 6:1;2 Timothy 2:24-26; 2 Thessalonians 3:15
- Quietly, discreetly, humbly in order to bring the sin to light and expose the fault.
- "... You have won your brother."
 Our only aim or purpose!
 The word "brother" indicates a familial relationship with an obedient believer.
 The word "won" indicates the current state of being lost.

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"Go and show" -

What are some qualities that are needed to fulfill this command?

What else is imperative that we "go and show" with?

The scriptures!

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- 2) "But if he does not listen to you, take one or two more with you, so that by the mouth of two or three witnesses every fact may be confirmed." (Matthew 18:16)
 - Principle of the Old Law. (Deuteronomy 19:15)
 - What's the reason for bringing "one or two more with you"?
 - Not to intimidate or pressure rather to establish and confirm the "facts."
 - Again, the focus should be on the scriptures and not opinion or tradition. (cf. Matthew 15:1-2)
 - What if there aren't "one or two more ... witnesses"?

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3) "If he refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church ..." (Matthew 18:17)

The facts have already established or confirmed.

The sinning brother has first had the opportunity to:
• Hear from the offended brother and witnesses.

Why "tell it to the church"?

Fodder for gossip? (2 Corinthians 12:20; Proverbs 20:19)

What is "the church" to do with this?

The manner to be done: Galatians 6:1;

2 Thessalonians 3:15.

Important to remember the original goal: to win our brother.

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4) "... if he refuses to listen even to the church, let him be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector." (Matthew 18:17)

The facts have already been established/confirmed and shared with the local congregation.

Now, he is given the opportunity to "listen ... to the church."

Who specifically is speaking for "the church"?

Elders, preacher, all the members.

Yet, and especially at this point, the purpose must be restated: to win your brother. In order to accomplish that ...

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- 4) "... let him be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector." (Matthew 18:17; Matthew 9:11; Acts 10:28)
 - Addressed by Paul in: 2 Thessalonians 3:6, 14-15; 1 Corinthians 5:1-11.
 - "Keep away from" (2 Thessalonians 3:6)
 - "Do not associate with him" (2 Thessalonians 3:14)
 - "... not to associate with any so-called brother ..." (1 Corinthians 5:11)

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- 4) "... let him be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector." (Matthew 18:17)
 - Purpose:
 - Bring the sinner to the point of being ashamed of his sin with the will to repent. (2 Thessalonians 3:14; Jeremiah 6:15)
 - To save his soul! (1 Corinthians 5:5)
 - We are to "reaffirm our love" to the one who repents. (2 Corinthians 2:8)
 - Preserve the purity of the church.(1 Corinthians 5:6-8; 1 Timothy 5:20)

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Key takeaways:

- Resolve sin and offenses at the lowest level and with the fewest number of people knowing (verse 15). "If he listens to you, you have won your brother."
- Facts and truth are of utmost importance. It's what actually took place (verse 16).
- The manner of presenting and receiving is critically important.
- Reconciliation and forgiveness doesn't take place without listening on both sides (cf. James 1:19), to the word of God and each other. (Joshua 22)

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
